Throughout August Dreamland has taken part in the media circus. Earlier this month BBC Two's Coast production team arrived in Margate on the trail of the traditional seaside landlady. The crew spent a morning filming the show's presenter, Alice Roberts, visiting the Scenic Railway, which will feature in the show next year. BBC One's Country Tracks, also featuring Dreamland, is expected to broadcast before the end of this year.

Week beginning 23 August BBC Radio Kent will be broadcasting a special Dreamland feature, by Jo Burn, around 7-9am each morning and BBC Radio London will be doing a live broadcast featuring Dreamland for the Robert Elms show around 1.30pm on the 24 August.

Up until the 26 August Londoners will be able to visit Margate in their lunch hour at the Seasider pop-up shop exhibition located at 42 Theobalds Road in Holborn. HIGH VOLTAGE By Bob Preedy

As we know from our home bills, the price of electricity and gas continues to rise – and shows no sign of reducing in the years ahead. So for the sake of the Dreamland bills we looked at what alternatives might be available to refurbishing our vintage rides.

Modern motors are designed to run quieter and with less electricity so we wondered whether they're also tough enough to withstand the sea air and the varying temperatures that make up summertime in Margate... Whilst pondering this, we delved into the world of green energy – perhaps a wind turbine on top of the Cinema fin – and solar panels on the roof?

South Eastern Railway has recently developed a method of capturing the power and heat generated by braking, and then feeding it back into their grid. Perhaps we could utilise our Scenic Railway to produce free power as the cars thunder down the dips?

And how about an entrance pathway that generates power from the weight of people's footsteps – the more you eat, the more power to the park? The Big Wheel might have a mini windmill on each carriage, and the friction caused by a mat on the Helter Skelter might add a few volts.

Most promising of all is a bog standard chain reaction – producing free methane gas from the toilets. Seaweed from the harbour could be added for an additional power boost.

The power supply for the park peaks at about 400 kW when everything is up and running. Coincidently the daily power for Dreamland would run two big fridges for two years – so any ideas to slash electricity usage will be gratefully received.

I am pleased to say we are now approaching the final stages of arrangements to transfer over half the Dreamland site to Dreamland Trust's local authority partner, Thanet District Council, and just as soon as this is complete, we can make a practical start on site works. As all Dreamland supporters know, it has been a long haul but Rome wasn't built in a day and it is important for the long term that we get the foundations right at the outset.

Why is it taking so long, and why can't we just use the funding we have secured to make a start anyway? Well there has been no lack of willingness to get the land transfer deal done. The current landowner, Margate Town Centre Regeneration Company Ltd, has been very co-operative and wants, just as much as we do, to see a successful Dreamland amusement park around the restored Scenic Railway and Dreamland Cinema. Clearly however, it must also have regard to its future plans on that part of the site that it will retain and as these become clearer so we get closer to the deal being done.

Thanet District Council is also hugely supportive and playing its part not just in funding commitments but in terms of taking on the Dreamland amusement park site from Margate Town Centre Regeneration Company Ltd, taking responsibility for some of the major contract works that need to be done and, in due course, for making the site available for Dreamland Trust to operate.

The reason we can't start physical works until the site is transferred relates to conditions of the funders.

Sound complicated? Well it is I guess, but the simple fact is that we will shortly be in a position to go and despite the delays believe that we can be up and running for 2012.
